Major Sins and Minor Sins

It is sometimes said, "Sin is sin"—and the thought is that all sins incur guilt equally, and so one sin is no worse than another. Let's briefly explore this idea.

There is a sense in which it is true that no matter what kind of sin it is, if it's in the category of sin, it is a violation of God's will and is offensive to him. "All sin is lawlessness" (1 John 3:4). With this perspective, there are no major sins versus minor sins. Some of the various vice lists that name and condemn sin (Mark 7:21-23, Romans 1:29-31, 1 Corinthians 6:9f, Galatians 5:19-21, etc.) include actions that one might consider "minor" sins right along with "major" sins with no apparent distinction. In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus indicated that anger is subject to judgment just as murder is (Matthew 5:21f), and lust in the heart is as wrong as the act of adultery (Matthew 5:27f).

On the other hand, 1 John 5:16 says that there is sin that leads to death (condemnation) and sin that does not lead to death. This is not talking about a particular sin. The ESV Study Bible rightly says, "Sin that leads to death is probably sin that is (1) unrepented of [in contrast to 1 John 1:9] and (2) of the kind or nature that John has warned about throughout the letter: resolute rejection of the true doctrine about Christ, chronic disobedience to God's commandments, persistent lack of love for fellow believers—all indications of a lack of saving faith—which will not be forgiven." John affirms that "all wrongdoing is sin" (vs. 17), but sin that is persisted in, stubbornly and high-handedly, is viewed differently than sin committed out of weakness while walking in the light (1 John 1:7) and genuinely working to overcome it.

It is also evident that some sins generate greater effects and consequences than other sins. Physical acts of murder or adultery will have greater consequences in this life than if they are committed only in the heart, even though the inner posture and the outward acts are equally guilty in God's sight. Jesus said that the one who delivered him to Pilate had "greater sin" than Pilate (John 19:11). Ezekiel 8:6,13 says that some things are "more detestable" than other things.

Thinking that "sin is sin" can lead to using "little" sins to excuse "big" sins, reasoning that since we're all guilty of little sins, it's inconsistent to judge anyone's big sin. Also, we know that seemingly little sins do great damage (envy caused the Jews to seek Jesus' death, Matthew 27:18). Any sin has the potential of corroding faith and desensitizing one to the will of God. Rather than rationalizing and accepting a sin, whether major or minor, God seeks for us to be done with all sin.
