"You have answered correctly," Jesus replied. "Do this and you will live." Luke 10:25-28.

It becomes more and more apparent, with each passing day, that our world is overrun with sin. There is a darkness that is constantly fighting to snuff out the light. We are commanded by Christ to make disciples of all nations and to be a light of the world but these days it seems to be an impossible task. It can be so easy to become discouraged on our spiritual walk. We may find ourselves overwhelmed and on the verge of giving up the faith entirely.

Thankfully, Paul offers us a reassurance in the book of 2 Corinthians 5:1-5. In this passage, the apostle Paul is teaching us that there is a home waiting for us that is far greater than the one we currently reside in. It is human nature to desire a payoff and to have a reward for the hard work that we do. When we study hard in school, we hope that the reward will be a good grade. Maybe you have been putting in overtime hours for your career and have not been taking days off? I would assume that you would expect a promotion that is accompanied by a pay increase. This same principle applies to our spiritual journey with Christ. If we live for him each day and remain obedient, although it is hard work, we will be compensated for it by receiving eternal life. This is, without a doubt, the greatest reward of them all and far outweighs a grade in school or a pay increase at work.

Paul begins chapter 5 by entertaining the idea that our earthly home can be destroyed. As we have seen with the war in Israel, tomorrow is never guaranteed. So many homes have been destroyed, lives have either been taken or changed forever, all in a matter of days. Paul, with his background as a tentmaker, compares our earthly home to a tent. He says that while we are living in this tent there will be "groaning" and that we will always have a longing for our heavenly home. While life here on Earth might be dark and dreary and uncertain, we have a God who has made us a promise for something better. Paul concludes in verse 5 by saying, "He who has prepared us for this very thing is God, who has given us the Spirit as a guarantee." Nothing is certain but the Spirit. We can tackle these unpredictable times with the Word of God and we can rest on His promise that our perseverance will be rewarded.

Does it sound reasonable - - even scriptural - - to begin our inspections with self first. That just might stop a lot of unjust judgment in our brotherhood. May God help us all with the wisdom to look into our own hearts before ever passing judgment on someone else.
