2 Corinthians 4:16

Thomas Carlyle labored with intensity on his first book about the French Revolution, and felt it was his greatest work. He gave the manuscript to his friend John Stuart Mill to proofread and edit. Mill read the loose pages of the book in his den, beside the fireplace.

One morning, Mill's maid, cleaning the room and seeing the scattered pages on the floor, threw the only manuscript of the lengthy work into the fire. When Carlyle learned his work had been destroyed, he sank into a deep depression. All his work, wasted.

Sometime later, still downcast, he began watching a brick mason through a window. The man was standing on a scaffold, whistling and singing as he built the wall of a house, laying one brick at a time.

Carlyle decided he could write his book again. Simply focusing on one page at a time. His three-volume history of the French Revolution became famous and Carlyle is remembered today as one of Scotland's greatest writers.

Maybe you've had a setback. Maybe you've lost something valuable to you. Don't give up! Tomorrow still has promise. The Lord blesses faithful, even plodding, work. How do you turn a setback into a comeback? Brick by brick. Step by step. Day by day. Moment by moment. Page by page.


